2021 ANNUAL REPORT

MISSION STATEMENT: The Westmoreland Historical Society is an educational organization dedicated to acquiring and managing resources related to the history of Westmoreland County and using these resources to encourage a diverse audience to make connections to the past, develop an understanding of the present, and provide direction for the future.

The Westmoreland Historical Society pursues its mission by

- Maintaining a 5,000+ volume non-circulating research library of genealogical, local, county, and regional materials.
- Providing research services related to genealogy and county history.
- Publishing a tri-annual journal Westmoreland History and other occasional publications.
- Managing Historic Hanna's Town, listed on the National Register of Historic Places. This has been done in partnership with Westmoreland County Parks and Recreation since 1969.
- Conducting programs at Historic Hanna's Town.
- Maintaining Historic Hanna's Town's archaeological collection of over 1 million artifacts.
- Documenting and managing a 700,000 item archives collection.
- Managing a curatorial (objects) collection.
- Providing educational materials via outreach to schools and teachers.
- Conducting adult, children, and family educational programs on a broad range of historical topics.
- Presenting changing exhibits about various aspects of Westmoreland County history and how it relates to national and world events.

The Westmoreland Historical Society is dedicated to advancing its mission by forming collaborations and partnerships with other public and private organizations that share the Society's philosophy and mission.

Governed by a policy-making Board of Directors, the Society's day-to-day operation and activities are the responsibility of a full-time executive director, two other full-time staff members, four part-time employees, one seasonal employee, and approximately 80 volunteers.

The **Westmoreland County Historical Society**, founded in 1908, is a 501 (c) 3 non-profit corporation registered in Pennsylvania.

2021 Programs & Accomplishments

Penn's Woods: Plenty for the Use of Man opened June 19 in the Kendra Gallery



Two Special Weekends Draw Biggest Crowds & prove to be both fun and educational!

June 19 & 20 Frontier Court Days

This signature event returned after a year off for the Covid-19 pandemic. Organized with the help of I.B.W.C.P. (Proctor's Militia), activities included two court sessions reenacting select cases heard at Hanna's Town 1773 to 1786; 18th century military encampment; multiple living history demonstrations; a Frontier Kids Station; period music; and a food booth.



July 31 & August 1 Civil War Encampment & Reenactment

This event, held every other year, was organized by Bob Sidley of the 40th Reg. 11th Pa. Reserve Co. C, but over 200 reenactors participated from more than half a dozen units! Presentations provided something to interest and engage everyone: displays throughout the day; scheduled talks, including a first person portrayal of Gen. George Meade; battle reenactments; a Children's Mock Battle; and a concert by the 46th PA Regiment Band.







<u>July 4:</u> Independence Day Celebration included militia demonstrations, living history displays, reading of the Declaration of Independence, & tours of Hanna's Tayern.



September 11 Anniversary Commemoration inside the stockade/fort at Historic Hanna's Town: featured readings and personal recollections and a moment of silence.
